What to Plant

Bedding Plants: Plants that can be added to the garden during the coolest months include begonias, browallia, lobelia, dianthus, dusty miller, and nicotiana.

Bulbs: Winter is a great time to plant bulbs that will bloom this spring. Some to try are Kaffir lily, crinums, and agapanthus. **See:** [Bulbs for Florida](#)

Herbs: Many herbs will thrive now that temperatures are cooler, including tarragon, thyme, dill, fennel, and any of the mints. **See:** [Herbs in the Florida Garden](#)

What to Do

Rejuvenate the landscape: Now is a good time to plant woody shrubs. Water frequently to get new plantings off to a good start. **See:** [Low Maintenance Landscape Plants for South Florida](#)

Crepe Myrtle: While crepe myrtles do not require pruning, removing seed pods, crossing branches and small twiggy growth improves the appearance and form of the plant. **See:** [Crepe Myrtle in Florida](#)

Pests: To control scale on citrus, shrubs, camellias, and deciduous fruit trees, apply horticultural oil while plants are dormant. **See:** [Insect Management in the Home Garden](#)

What to Do Every Month

- Adjust irrigation based on rainfall.
- Deadhead flowers to encourage new blooms.
- Monitor the garden for insects and disease.
- Plant trees, shrubs, and perennials and water until established.
- [Mow lawns](#) at recommended heights:
 - St. Augustine & Bahia: 3-4"
 - Centipede: 1.5-2.0"
 - Dwarf St. Augustine: 2.5"
